Minutes of the 27th Annual General Meeting of the Old Josephians' Association of NSW Inc held on Saturday 27 November 2016 at the Thornleigh Community Centre, Thornleigh, Sydney.

Present: 17 members including office bearers. Apologies: Mohan Alles. Elmo Xavier, Anston Francke.

The minutes of the previous annual general meeting, already circulated, were taken as read and approved. Proposed: Ivor Baptiste, seconded Ken Ferreira.

Matters discussed and decided:

- 1. Annual statement of accounts: These documents, already circulated, were approved after Treasurer Nishantha Seneviratne advised there were no post balance sheet items to report. Proposed, Fred de Souza, seconded, Emil Van Gramberg.
- **2.** President Chrys Fernando thanked the committee members and their spouses for another year of well-attended events. The emphasis was to provide members, their families and friends the opportunity to meet and greet and have a good time at an affordable cost.

He presented George with a special gift in thanks for his work as secretary of the club for the past 10 years.

A moment of silence was observed for the pass-

ing of Old Joes Iggy Paiva and Raj Cooray and the mothers of Kevin Pereira, Jayanthi Francke and Dericka Baptiste.

- **3.** Election of office bearers. In the absence of any nominations for positions on the committee Ken Ferreira proposed and Herbert Kreltszheim seconded that all the present office bearers be reelected. This was carried unanimously.
- **4.** The possibility of holding a combined dance in May with the Peterites is being discussed. The event hinges on the availability of the band, Misty, due to tour Australia next year and whether it will be feasible to stage a function selling some 400 tickets to break even.
- **5.** President Chrys urged members to renew their subscriptions regularly so that the club can meet its ongoing expenses at least. Aubrey Joachim observed that an umbrella association, say with the Peterites, will reduce the cost of insurance considerably.
- **6.** Fred de Souza proposed a vote of thanks to the Committee for their efforts during the year.
- **7.** Secretary George Rupesinghe thanked President Chrys for his drive and enthusiasm in leading the Association, and the members for their continuing support.

The meeting adjourned at 6.55 p.m. for the traditional Carol singing and dinner.

The last French missionary: Remembering Fr. Alphonse Margesz

To the memory of the Reverend Father Alphonse Margesz, OMI, vice rector of St. Joseph's College, Colombo, 1948-1965, on his 110th birth anniversary, with due honour and respect to his humble and valuable services rendered to St. Joseph's College and our great nation, Sri Lanka.

NCE THE sound of the bell is heard one could see Fr. Margesz, or better known as our dear Vice Rector, moving along from corridor to corridor and from class to class with a box of chalk in one hand and a blackboard duster in the other. The classes are quiet when there are teachers in them and noisy when there aren't any. On one such day our class was noisy and Fr. Margesz walked in. He asked who is supposed to be the teacher here today? Why is he not here? The third question would normally be what is the subject to be taught in this period today?


Whether we said physics, chemistry, algebra, geometry, arithmetic, statics, dynamics, trigonometry, botany or zoology, Fr. Margesz would ask where "you boys stopped at the last class you had." Fr. Margesz would then go to the blackboard, keep his box of chalk on the desk and continue from where we had stopped at the last class whatever the subject was.

Rather Alphonse Gerard Lucien Margesz OMI, was born on 28 September 1907 in the little industrial town of Lille, in Northern France. During the First World War he served his compulsory military service in the French Army and rose to the rank of sergeant major.

He commenced his primary theological studies in the seminary in Liege, Belgium, and completed his higher studies at the Gregorian University in Rome, obtaining a doctorate in philosophy. He was ordained on 26 June 1932 and came to Sri Lanka on 30 January 1933. He chose Sri Lanka for his missionary work due to the influence of the Very Rev. Fr. Peter Pillai OMI, the first Sri Lankan rector of the French missionary college, St. Joseph's. Father Peter Pillai was able to see the profound sterling value of Fr. Margesz, his contemporary at the Gregorian University in Rome.

In 1948 he was sent to the Catholic University of America in Washington DC, USA, where he obtained an MSc. degree in biology. On returning to Sri Lanka he took up duties as head teacher of biology at St. Joseph's College, Colombo, and served as vice rector for 15 long years.

Besides being a philosopher he was also a conscientious scientist, a mathematician of repute and a talented musician who trained and conducted the choir. He had a botanical garden at college where he was able to make a single rose tree bear red, yellow, white and pink roses. He was a beautiful singer with a rich baritone voice and, last but not least, he was a gifted artist.



It was during his time at St. Joseph's College that he was awarded the Distinction Chevalier de l'Ordre des Palmes Academique by the French government for the services he rendered in the field of education.

Fr. Margesz was so keen in our educational programs that he took every step to teach any of the subjects to get the class going. Not everybody could change from subject to subject like one could change from channel to channel on a television set just as he had it all well programmed not only in his head but also in his heart.

We believe that this was his God-given talent and a dedicated service both well mastered. As a result of this we see that every student who had studied under him is today doing yeoman service in society in the fields of engineering, medicine, law, armed forces, politics, church ministry or social media.

During his time the assistant in the biology lab who worked under Fr. Margesz was Mr. Laus.

He told me of this incident. You have been an altar server faithfully serving the Rector's or the Vice Rector's mass, (pujawa) every Sunday at 6 a.m. without fail for many years. You may not be aware that I clearly remember that on one such Sunday this mass which starts sharp on time started at about 6.05.

Later when I was having breakfast in the refectory with the sacristan, Mr. Marcelline, I asked

him, "Why did the mass, the *pujawa*, start a little late today about five minutes, after six?"

He replied, "Fr. Margesz did not start the mass because the student who comes to serve the Rector's Mass every Sunday was a little late. The Swami waited till the boy came and dressed up in his red cassock and it was only after all that did the Swami start the Sunday service."

I responded, "I never heard of a priest ever waiting till the altar boy arrives to start a mass. Are the altar boys so important?"

On Monday, the next day, when Fr. Margesz came to the biology lab Mr. Laus asked the Swami why he had to wait till the altar boy came.

Fr. Margesz, whom the college minor staff refer to as Pranser Swami, responded in good Sinhala with a heavy French accent. "This is to show the closeness of the altar boy and the priest. It is a new development coming from the Second Vatican Council in session now in Rome."

Fr. Margesz was always up to date in everything.

When teaching geometry, the triangles, circles or cyclic quadrilaterals he drew on the blackboard and his Sinhala letters written for certain explanations were like computer-printed images because Fr. Margesz was an excellent artist.

Many students of St Joseph's, both young and the old who learned under him, knew or came to know of Fr. Margesz and experience the depth of his great services, will always remember this missionary priest as one who has helped us greatly to fit right into the path of *in scientia et virtute*.

Pr. Margesz was sent to Rome to do a course in the judicial process of the matrimonial court and practised this ministry at Borella. While he worked there I used to visit him in his room and often I had to walk back very silently in order not to disturb him lying in bed in his white cassock. He used to do this due to fatigue in his midseventies.

On Monday 7 October 1985, a car at the Archbishop's House was to take Fr. Margesz to the doctor. But Fr. Margesz did not come down to the car. He was in his bed in his white cassock. He had breathed his last that day, a feast day of his Congregation.
