Significance of Poson to Sri Lankans

Poson' falls on the full moon day of June, and it is exactly one lunar month after 'Vesak' full moon day, the most significant day of the Buddhist calendar. For Sri Lankan Buddhists the Poson full moon day is equally significant and is well commemorated.

Upon the success of the 3rd Buddhist Council, Emperor Dharmasoka decided to send delegations to nine other countries to spread the message of the Buddha and chose his son Arahant Mahinda to be sent as special emissary to Sri Lanka along with five other Arahants and a layman. Arahant Mahinda's arrival was to coincide with the reign of King Devanampiyatissa (307-260 BC) who is believed to have had a strong relationship with his Indian counterpart.



On that Poson full moon day, the King was on a hunting expedition. While chasing a deer he lost his way and arrived at the foot of the Mihintale rock. Arahant Mahinda who was waiting for him called his name and started a conversation to test the King's intelligence. Satisfied that the King would be able to comprehend the Dhamma, the

Arahant delivered 'Chulahatthipadopama Sutta' (simile on the foot of an elephant) to explain the doctrine. Having listened to the sermon the King and his 40,000 followers embraced Buddhism thus marking the beginning of a new era in Sri Lankan history.

In the 3rd century BCE, the language in use in Sri Lanka may have been a mixture of the indigenous Hela and a development of the language brought by the Aryans who came from the Bay of Bengal and settled down in Sri Lanka about 200 years earlier. The two parties therefore, may not have found it too difficult to comprehend each other.

Prince Bhanduka, a nephew of Arahant Mahinda, became the first to be ordained in Sri Lanka, probably an act carried out as an incentive to draw Lankans to the Bhikkhu Sasana.

Buddhist cultural practices prevailed in the island. There was development in art, literature, writing and sculpture. Carvings on rocks, paintings and writings are seen even today making us admire the work of our ancient craftsmen and wonder what tools they would have used for those creations. The Thuparama chetiya is believed to be the first historic stupa/chaitya built in Sri Lanka that enshrined the right collarbone of the Buddha, gifted by Emperor Dharmasoka.

Later Arahant Mahinda's sister, Arahant Sanghamitta, also arrived in the island with the sacred Bo tree sapling and established the Bhikkuni Sasana in Sri Lanka by ordaining Queen Anula, King's sister, and other female disciples.

World Environment Day - June 5

The theme for World Environment Day 2023 is "Beat Plastic Pollution".

While plastic has many valuable uses, we have become addicted to single-use plastic products with severe environmental, social, economic and health consequences.

Around the world, one million plastic bottles are purchased every minute, while up to five trillion plastic bags are used worldwide every year. In total, half of all plastic produced is designed for single-use purposes – used just once and then thrown away.

Plastics including microplastics are now ubiquitous in our natural environment. They are becoming part of the Earth's fossil record and a marker of the Anthropocene, our current geological era. They have even given their name to a new marine microbial habitat called the "plastisphere".

So how did we get here?

From the 1950s to the 1970s, only a small amount of plastic was produced and, and as a result, plastic waste was relatively manageable.

However between the 1970s and the 1990s, plastic waste generation more than tripled, reflecting a similar rise in plastic production.

In the early 2000s, the amount of plastic waste we generated rose more in a single decade than it had in the previous 40 years.

Today, we produce about 400 million tonnes of plastic waste every year.

We are seeing other worrying trends. Since the 1970s, the rate of plastic production has grown faster than that of any other material. If historic growth trends continue, global production of primary plastic is forecasted to reach 1,100 million tonnes by 2050. We have also



seen a worrying shift towards single-use plastic products, items that are meant to be thrown away after a single short use.

Approximately 36 per cent of all plastics produced are used in packaging, including single-use plastic products for food and beverage containers, approxi-

mately 85 per cent of which ends up in landfills or as unregulated waste.

Additionally, some 98 per cent of single-use plastic products are produced from fossil fuel, or "virgin" feedstock. The level of greenhouse gas emissions associated with the production, use and disposal of conventional fossil fuel-based plastics is forecast to grow to 19 per cent of the global carbon budget by 2040.

Systemic change is needed to stop the flow of plastic waste ending up in the environment.

Of the seven billion tonnes of plastic waste generated globally so far, less than 10 per cent has been recycled. Millions of tonnes of plastic waste are lost to the environment, or sometimes shipped thousands of kilometres to destinations where it is mostly burned or dumped. The estimated annual loss in the value of plastic packaging waste during sorting and processing alone is US\$ 80- 120 billion.

Cigarette butts — whose filters contain tiny plastic fibers — are the most common type of plastic waste found in the environment. Food wrappers, plastic bottles, plastic bottle caps, plastic grocery bags, plastic straws, and stirrers are the next most common items. Many of us use these products every day, without even thinking about where they might end up.

We have seen a lot of positive action, but the truth is that we all need to do more and turn off the tap on plastic pollution at the source.

There are many things that you as an individual can do- from asking the restaurants you visit to stop using plastic straws, to bringing your own coffee mug to work, to pressuring your local authorities to improve how they manage your city's waste. Take the Clean Seas pledge and adopt new habits to limit your plastic footprint.

Clean a Beach: If you live near a coastline, join beach clean-ups in your area. Or take your family along on a beach walk and start your own clean-up.

Clean a River: Rivers are direct pathways of plastic debris into the ocean. Join a river clean-up or do your own! The river will look nicer and benefit its ecosystem and the ocean.

Shop Sustainably: Next time you are out shopping, choose food with no plastic packaging, carry a reusable bag, buy local products, and refill containers to reduce your plastic waste and effect on the environment.

Try a Zero-Waste Lifestyle: Become a zero-waste champion. Invest in sustainable, ocean-friendly products- reusable coffee mugs, water bottles and food wraps. Consider options like menstrual cups, bam-

boo toothbrushes and shampoo bars. These will help you save money and the ocean too.

Travel Sustainably: When you are on holiday, try to watch your single-use plastic intake. Refuse miniature bottles in hotel rooms, take your own reusable drinking bottle and use reef-safe sunscreen, without microplastics.



Be an advocate for change: Ask your local supermarkets, restaurants and local suppliers to ditch plastic packaging, refuse plastic cutlery and straws, and tell them why. Pressure your local authorities to improve how they manage waste.

Dress Sustainably: The fashion industry produces 20 per cent of global wastewater and 10 per cent of global carbon emissions. That's more than all international flights and maritime shipping combined. Consider sustainable clothing lines, vintage shops and repair your clothes when possible.

Choose plastic-free personal care products: Personal care products are a major source of microplastics, which get washed into the oceans straight from our bathrooms. Look for plastic-free face wash, day cream, makeup, deodorant, shampoo and other products.

Indeed, this is the most beautiful time of the night- the time Sandella - the evening program of Radio 4EB Sri Lankan Group broadcasting in Sinhala goes on air, every Wednesday from 9.00- 10.00PM.



On 26 May 2023, at the station's community hall, Radio 4EB Sri Lankan Group marked 25 continuous years of Sandella broadcasting at a euphoric gathering of members past and present.

Sandella was the innovative response to the deeply felt need to attract young members to the Programming Group to ensure sustainability. The privilege of broadcasting in Sinhala over Radio 4EB, the only radio channel dedicated to community languages in QLD, was an opportunity to be treasured. (Currently Radio 4EB broadcasts programs in 50 different languages.) Sandella had a dual purposemake the program attractive to the youth and provide light- hearted entertainment to listeners. With this dual purpose as its mission, the first Sandella program went on air on 26 May 1998. The zenith of the jubilee celebration was the live broadcast from 9.00-10.00 pm that Wednesday evening. Participating in this special broadcast was a spectrum of programmers - some who had been participants of the very first program, and those through 25 years to the present time.

Youthful participation both on the panel and microphone, meticulous attention paid to technology for high quality rendition, live singing was evidence of purpose turning into passion.

The highlight of the evening



was listening to the experiences of programmers presenting Sandella, paying scant attention to dark, icy cold nights and distances to travel to get to the station on time after work, single-mindedly intent only on presenting Sandella, enjoying camaraderie with fellow programmers.

It was also the occasion to pay tribute to the vision and leadership of those founding members - the silver thread binding the Group, enriching the lives of youthful programmers, the thread of protection, "Yajnopavitha" (පූර්ණ නූල), providing clearly spelt out guidelines on the purpose and presentation of Sandella.

Sandella is an enduring legacy of commitment to the Sri Lankan community.

Stories Behind Names of Places in Sri Lanka KAYMAN'S GATE

This was a very famous place in Sri Lanka when it was under the Portuguese, Dutch and the British. Sinhala people called it "Kayman dorakada". The story is very interesting as it reveals war strategies of the era.



It is common knowledge that the Portuguese were the first to capture Colombo. After deceiving the Sri Lankan King in Kotte, they sought permission to have a land, the size of a cattle skin for their settlement. The King willingly approved the proposal. The story is that the Portuguese cut a cattle skin into thin strips and joined together forming a large extent of land. Thereafter, they built the Colombo fort on it and slowly constructed a waterway around it. The Beira Lake is a part of it and the area we identify as Colombo

Fort was the place where the Portuguese Fort was. This was later used by the Dutch and then by the British, extending and developing it as their main centre. This area in Sinhala is called "Kotuwa". "Pita Kotuwa" area is the land outside the fort. To date, we use these two words as key parts of the Colombo City: "Kotuwa and Pitakotuwa".


Kayman's Gate was the main entrance to the Portuguese Fort. The story is interesting as to how it was called Kayman's gate. This fort was captured by the Dutch in 1656. There were crocodiles in the waterways around the fort. Some say they came to eat the food discarded to the canal. There is also a view that they were bred to prevent the enemies coming.

However, the Dutch word for crocodiles is "KAAIMAN". So, the gate, the main entrance to the Fort, was referred to by the Sinhalese "Kayman Dorakada". "Dora" is the Sinhala word for the door "Dorakada" means "the entrance".

The original bell at "Kayman's Gate" can be seen even today at the intersection of Main Street and 4th Cross Street in the Colombo Fort area.

The late Mr. Dhanapala is renowned globally for chairing the 1995 Nuclear Non-proliferation Treaty Review and Extension Conference and for his expertise and dedication to a world free of weapons of mass destruction including disarmament and non-proliferation of nuclear weapons. He wrote several books and articles notably on the topics of international security, non-proliferation, disarmament and multilateral diplomacy.

Book Review: Four Thousand Weeks: Time Management for Mortals, by Oliver Burkeman

If an average human lifespan is 80 years, Oliver Burkeman equates that to around 4000 weeks in which to live. A former writer for the Guardian, and self-proclaimed advocate for productivity in his youth



complete with weekly planners and to-do lists, in his mid-life, Burkeman is forced to confront the fundamental reality that is the basis of this book: that time is finite. That this is not a practice run for another parcel of time that we will be given. That we will never get to the bottom of our inbox or to-do list. Instead, this is a challenge to stop expecting to find the magic bullet that will make us more efficient and rather accept this reality and instead focus on prioritising how we choose to spend our finite weeks.

As part of his exploration of time, Burkeman provides a summary of how time has been viewed historically and the impact of the Industrial Revolution on the commodification of time. He also explores social and psychological factors, such as digital distraction, social media and self-help-guru driven obsession with the dubious virtue of productivity as well as a decline in faith, that have contributed to the anxiety that drives our inner conflict with achievement and time.

Part historical, part introspective, this book is not a self help book. Instead it is written to provoke reflection on our own values while making us aware of why we view time as we do, inspire us to view time differently and to give us permission to consciously step off the hamster-wheel. Ultimately it is a challenge to stop trying to do everything and focus on allocating time to what is most important to us knowing that this inevitably, but consciously, means letting go of other things. So, how will you spend your four thousand weeks?

Sri Lankan English: An Unrecognised Creole

English language ostensibly arrived in Ceylon in 1796 with the first British sailors and immediately began evolving into a new language. In order to understand this change, it is important to understand two terms.

A pidgin is the result of two or more different languages meeting. This leads to the development of a new language using vocabulary, grammar, and language habits of all these languages.

When this new language is transmitted to a new generation as their mother tongue, the language becomes a creole.

It is within this context that I wish to introduce the concept of Sri Lankan English Creole (SLEC) to describe a type of English unique to Sri Lanka.

Some unique features of SLEC that readers may recognise:

SLEC completely reorganises Standard English grammar, and adds words and sentiments from the 20 or more languages in SL in order to express complex concepts. For example: "Aiyoo, real sothy fellow no?" incorporates the Dravidian language words aiyoo and sothy, meaning feeble or ineffectual, with Sinhala grammar and English vocabulary.

There is the use of Victorian idioms and metaphors as a method of expressing emotions. For instance, "aaa, gone for a six" is used to denote a disappointing accident. Or the term "many happy returns of the day" as a birthday wish. Or "real bull in a China shop no men" to express frustration at clumsiness.

There is an inversion of English grammar like a jazz musician playing with musical scales "Ane, on the light will-you".

Then there are humorous examples of character judgement: "Here, that bugger is an ace boozer men!" when disparagingly referring to drunkenness. Or "They are carrying on like nothing ah!" to signify a blatant affair or romantic relationship.

There is also a complex tonality, gestures, and facial expressions complementing each statement which conveys a great deal of meaning. For instance, "ane-sin no?" when expressing strong feelings of pity or sympathy is often accompanied by a sad facial expression.

Sometimes a single word can convey a great deal of meaning. "You have put-on" indicates the listener has gained weight.

"Here, just wait men", which appears in standard English as a request for patience but is actually a stern expression of disbelief in SLEC. Akin to the Sinhala "Meh nikan inna".

Many nations have embraced their English creoles, such as Singlish and Manglish in Singapore and Malaysia. West African and Belizean creoles, Jamaican Patois, and Tok Pisin from Papua New Guinea.

SLEC has not received the recognition it deserves, particularly in light of class conscious obsessions with correctness in English. SLEC is often disparagingly referred to by some as broken English or sometimes Lansi English.

Transport (Sri Lanka Section), the Chairman of the Tertiary and Vocational Education Commission, a Member of the National Education Commission, a Member of the Academic Council of the National Institute of Education, the Secretary General of the Asian Association of Open Universities, the President of the Institution of Engineers Sri Lanka, a Member of the Board of Governors of the Commonwealth of Learning, a Member of the Board of Trustees of the Asian Institute of Technology, the Chairman of the Institute for Construction Training and Development (ICTAD), Member of Board of Governors, Arthur C. Clarke Institute for Modern Technologies, the Chairman, Uni-Consultancy Services, the Secretary of the Ministry of Skills Development, Vocational and Technical Education, the Local Team Leader and Consultant in the Asian Development Bank (ADB) funded project on Distance Education Modernisation and Technical Education Development, and Honorary. Governor, Gateway Graduate School.
