



"Rt. Rev. Dr Paul Perera Bishop of Kandy then handed over the official vesting document to the minister amidst the beating of magul bera and the blowing of conch shells" - thus reported the CDN on 14.09.1977. With that the hundred and twenty three year old Church ownership of the college ended.



How did this come about?. We have to go a few days back for the beginning of the end. It all began with a call for a walkout by the senior students on 4th of August 1977. As stated by Fr Aiden in his newsletter this walk out supposedly as a protest for lack of teachers became a commotion and a riot demanding the removal of the Principal. His lordship who had visited the College on hearing of the unrest, along with the other authorities, decided to close school immediately.

This incident, unprecedented in the history of the College, created a great unrest amongst the Old Boys. All efforts were directed towards reopening the college after taking remedial action. It was generally accepted that the boys alone would not have embarked on such actions without the active support of the teachers. The parents who were summoned for a meeting gave their unstinting support and the call was to get rid of the bad eggs and reopen College. Old boys too met regularly at the club house and discussed ways and means of resolving the issue. An OBA General meeting was to be summoned but an islandwide evening curfew declared because of communal riots became an obstacle.



Against this backdrop there appeared a press notice by His Lordship summoning Old Boys and well-wishers for a meeting. This was widely welcomed by all concerned for it appeared that finally all is well. It would not be far-fetched to say that Old Boys attended the meeting gleefully. Despite the curfew there was a fair crowd gathered at the College Hall when His Lordship and the Vicar General walked in. It did not take long for the bombshell to explode. After a few introductory words the Lordship announced

"I as proprietor of St Anthony's College have decided to handover the college to the state". The mike was then taken over by the Vicar General who too came with an equally startling statement, "You are allowed to speak if you wish to but limit it to five minutes and give cogent and compelling reasons why the College should not be handed over". A few did speak, mostly appealing not to hand over. One prominent Old Antonian got up and said one word, "Betrayal", and sat down. It was Spencer Dias. With that all speeches stopped. That one word conveyed the sentiments of all present that day, Betrayal.

Few days later the handing over ceremony was held. Soon the vesting was completed and a layman appointed as the Manager of the school who continued as the head till the appointment of Fr Stephen.

Only thing we would do then was to show our displeasure, which we did by passing a vote of censure against the Lordship. The Colombo branch wanted to go further. They gave notice of a resolution at the AGM which said, hand over the entirety of the college property to the state and the OBA to have as its Patron the Director of Education. This resolution had widespread support of the members and would have passed with a big majority had it being tabled. The older diehards however prevented it being tabled with the Chair declaring it wouldn't be tabled as no proper notice was given, resulting in the Colombo Branch tabling a vote of censure against the Central Council for the manner in which its resolutions were dealt with. The AGM itself was divisive. For the first time there was a contest for the Presidency. The older guard led by Mr Maharoof carried the day but with a majority of only six votes. Had it gone the other way the status of the college today would be far far different.

Soon after the election I remember going with Mr Maharoof to pay a courtesy call on his Lordship. Much was discussed at this meeting. The letter now in circulation giving its outcome has been very helpful in our subsequent negotiations.

The Old Boys never accepted the handing over nor the splitting of the College premise. This was the land bestowed on the future generations of Antonians by our own Old Boy Bishop.

May it please Your Lordship,

At the Central Council Meeting of our Association held on 10th February 1978 the President informed the meeting that he and the Secretary called on Your Lordship and had a discussion on matters affecting the 0.B.A.

The President stated that from this discussion he was able to ascertain that -

- 1. The O.B.A. Premises has been excluded from the property vested in the Government.
- 2. The O.B.A. will continue to house their headquarters in the premises now occupied by them as long as this property is not vested in the State.
- 3. Your Lordship will continue to safeguard the interests of the Association.
- 4. There is as yet no written agreement with the State regarding the handing over of the School.
- 5. The Hon. Minister of Education has given an assurance that the name of the school, its crest and the school anthem will not be changed and that its traditions will be maintained and that the O.B.A. will be given due recognition and representation in a Parent-Teacher-Association or in any such organization formed to help the school in its administration.
- 6. That St. Anthony's College will be an all island, school.
- 7. That the College was given over to the State only after all possible alternatiges had been considered.
- 8. That Your Lordship consider the handing over of St.Anthony's College was in the best interest of the School, the Students and Parents.
- 9. That Your Lordship assures that in the event of the O.B.A. having any fund raising project for the O.B.A., the College Hall will be available free of charge.

Finally in the event of Your Lordship entering into any written agreement with the State, we would desire that the rights, privileges, property and other interests of the O.B.A. be safeguarded.

The O.B.A. wishes to take this opportunity to express its thanks to Your Lordship for the courtesy shown to its President and the Secretary when they called on Your Lordship.

Like it or not we had to accept reality. College was now a Govt School. Yet there was much we could do. We set about doing it. The first was to get a Catholic priest as Principal. According to the letter sent by the Secretary the Govt had accepted on principle to uphold the traditions of the College. Then a Catholic priest as Principal is a must. Similarly to provide the same facilities and the environment and uphold the traditions the use of the entirety of land that constituted college is also a must. We the SACKOBA acted on that premise.

Getting Fr Stephen as Principal was a long process, a narrative too long to pen here. Suffice to say you are lucky if you are at the correct place at the correct time. I was. You will note all the letters I have had as secretary are addressed to Kandy Weaving Mills Ltd. This institution was forcibly acquired by the Madam Sirimavo govt under the nefarious Business acquisition Act. When JRJ came to power in July 77 a team worked on it and got it divested. I was in that team and joined this institution as an Accountant soon after the divesting. The relationships that were built up there helped us in our endeavor to get Fr Stephen appointed as Principal. We were able to take it to the Cabinet and get it approved. Once we got the good news we wasted no time but went to Monte Fano, collected Rev Father and rushed to the Department of Education to get his appointment. We had a problem there.

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The department head was totally unaware of the situation, but he was good enough to tell us to wait till he verified it. We did wait for several hours but he came with the good news that Rev Father's appointment was indeed approved. His advice was Rev Father to go to the College and await the letter of appointment which was promptly refused by Father. He wouldn't go without some sort of an official letter. There was another wait till matters were sorted out with the higher authorities. Finally we got what was wanted and were soon on the way to College with Rev Father as Principal.

I vividly remember that journey to College in an old open Austin Jeep with Rev Father in front with the driver, myself and Mr Augastine Peiris in the rear. We entered College but there was no ceremony, no magul bera, no reporters to greet us.



Renowned Old Antonian Soil Scientist, Dr. C. R. Panabokke, Passes Away

Christopher Rajindra Panabokke was born in 1926 in Panabokke, a village in Udunuwara, Kandy. He boarded at Hillwood College, Kandy, in 1930, and later, in 1934, he was admitted to St. Anthony's College, Kandy.



When asked by an interviewer, "Why not Trinity?", his response was, "My parents believed that a Catholic school could instil discipline in a young boy. Besides, at that time, St. Anthony's had a better reputation for academic work."

He continued, "At St. Anthony's, my schooling was interrupted for two terms due to malaria. I was at the boarding house. When the College premises were taken over by the Army, I became a day-scholar. Those days, rules were applied to everyone, and there was no favouritism."

Afterward, he joined St. Benedict's College for one year before gaining entrance to the University of Ceylon in 1945. He graduated with honours in chemistry in 1949. He joined the Department of Agriculture and worked as a Research Personnel at MahaIlluppallama, following a brief stay in Polonnaruwa Sugarcane research.

He was selected for a Soil Fertility Training course in India by FAO. Later, he pursued a Ph.D. in Soil Science from the University of Adelaide in Australia. Dr. Panabokke returned to the country and was once again posted to Mahalluppallama.

From 1975 to 1977, he served as the Director of Research in the Department of Agriculture. He played a pivotal role in setting up regional research centres in Aralaganwila, Makandura, and Kilinochchi.

After his retirement, Dr. Panabokke worked in several international research organisations. He held the position of Senior Research Fellow at International Services for National Agriculture Research at The Hague and worked as an Irrigation Agronomist at the International Irrigation Management Institute (IMI). Dr. Panabokke authored numerous publications covering various aspects of soil science.

Throughout his career, Dr. Panabokke received several accolades and awards, including the National Science Council Award for Outstanding Research (1982), Vidya Jyothi in 1986, and Deshamanya in 1998. He also served as the Chancellor of the University of Sabaragamuwa.

Renowned Old Antonian Soil Scientist, Dr. C. R. Panabokke, Passes Away

Dr. C. R. Panabokke passed away in August of this year at the age of 97, and his cremation took place on the 31st of August in Colombo.

Dr. Panabokke remained a loyal Old Boy of St. Anthony's and was among the 102 distinguished Old Antonians who received the ANTONIAN AWARD OF EXCELLENCE in 2004 during the Sesquicentennial celebrations of the College. He also graced the Annual Prize Giving of the College in 1976 as the Chief Guest during the time of Late Fr. Aidan de Silva. The Antonian fraternity extends its deepest condolences to the bereaved family. May his soul rest in peace.


Noteworthy Boxing History of St. Anthony's College, Kandy

Boxing was introduced to the schools in Ceylon during the first decade of the 20th century. Two Old boys, Messrs. Cyril E. S. Perera (later Queen's Counsel & MP for Colombo North) and M. J. Taylor, were instrumental in bringing the game to St. Anthony's College, Kandy, inspired by Mr. L. Mc D. Robinson, a lecturer at the Government Training College. St. Anthony's was fortunate to obtain the services of the famed boxing trainer, Mr. John Gaye. Boxing had become so popular that it was hard to decide which of the two games, cricket or boxing, was more popular, with a large number of athletes taking up the sport.

In the STUBBS SHIELD tournament, which started in 1914, St. Anthony's participated for the first time in 1918 and became the runner-up with 13 points, following Trinity's 19 points. The following year, St. Anthony's avenged the defeat to win the coveted Shield for the first time. In the year 1919, Jack Glanville, N. H. Keerthiratne (later a cabinet Minister), and Robert Wright, also the Antonian Cricket captain in 1919 and a respected teacher at the College in the latter years, won all their fights.

St. Anthony's retained the shield in 1920 with Greig Meynert, Keerthiratne, N. Rodrigo, and Jack Glanville defeating all their opponents, while Austin Williams lost in the final. "THE ANTONIAN" the College magazine of 1924, records the excellent performance of the three Ratwatte brothers, especially the youngest, Sidney, who won all his matches. St. Anthony's finished second in the tournament. Billy Forsyth won the finals of Light Heavyweights.



In 1922, Dicky Tennant, S. V. de Alwis, and N. Rodrigo were unbeaten, and the school came second in the STUBBS SHIELD. In the following year, fielding a side with a number of newcomers, the school was placed third behind the top teams Trinity and St. Thomas'. Ronald Stephens and Rodrigo won in their respective weight categories. The school won the STUBBS SHIELD for the third and the last time in 1924.

Antonian boxers had their heyday during this era, as in a matter of a few years, they reached a very high standard, and some of them gained recognition as All Ceylon Champions. L. V. Jayaweera, Robert Wright, N. H. Keerthiratne, Jack Glanville, S. V. de Alwis, Dicky Tennant, James Ferguson, Austin Williams, C. Radcliffe, V. Rosayro, Bill Forsyth, Albert Victor, Ronald Stephens, N. Rodrigo, and Bede Perera, to name a few of the Antonian Boxing Ring. St. Anthony's had the distinction of producing as many as eleven champions in the Ceylon Boxing Ring since 1921.

The school produced a "knock-out king" in Robert Wright, who was a dread for the other schools, having tasted defeat only once in his entire career.

L. V. Jayaweera (also Cricket captain in 1921) was undoubtedly the most accomplished boxer to come out of SACK. Some of his achievements were:

- 1923 Featherweight Champion
- 1924 Lightweight Champion
- 1925 Lightweight Champion
- 1927 Welterweight Champion
- Winner of Lightweight Ceylon Defense Force Meet

- 1928 - Selected to represent Ceylon in the All India tournament

- 1930 - Winner of "Fellows Gordon" Cup for most scientific boxer

Sadly, the game started to fade away from the minds of Antonians in the early 1930s and sank into oblivion thereafter, least expected in a school that was a powerhouse in boxing in the early years.

For over a month the College Boarding House lay shrouded in a peace that cast its spell over those who remained looking forward hopefully to rest after a term's hard toil. Then on the 17th January it began to show signs of a return to life. 'The Rainbow', 'the Mansion', 'the Villa', and 'Journey's End' awoke from their slumber, and echoed to the voice of youth. happy, buoyant, full of zest for pleasure and enjoyment. Soon voices died down to whispers, or rose here and there to a crescendo, recording varying human emotionssurprise, anxiety, love, grief, despair. Fr. Theophane, their Warden, had gone! It was incredible! It could not be true! Yes! It was true. He had gone, gone without a word to any of them, tearing himself away from the place he loved deeply, the boys, big and small, to whose interests he had passionately devoted his life, and who in turn rewarded him with their unstinted affection. Incredible, but true! Fr. Theophane, their beloved Warden, had indeed left them!


Who has not seen at St. Anthony's a dapper priest with luxuriant hair, and bright eyes twinkling through round, horn rimmed glasses, radiating warmth and cheerfulness around him? Like the electron, the tiniest particle known to physicists, he is in a state of perpetual motion, he leads a life of ceaseless activity. His tiny office with a porthole, bearing above it the legend, "The Warden. Hours of Business, 8-30 a.m.-12 a.m., 1 p.m.-3 p.m." is more often than not empty.. Callers for the day must first embark on a voyage of discovery of the elusive Warden. Will he be at the Infirmary? Not unlikely, as there are reports of a few fever cases. The Dairy? Probable, as there is a sick cow, and the yield of milk for the month has been rather low.

Not in either? It is quite possible then that he is inspecting the new building in the course of construction, or has gone to the neighbouring convent, or has been summoned suddenly to the Convent of the Carmelites. Guesses are hazardous, as they all prove wrong. Fr. Theophane took the early morning train to Colombo at 2-30 a.m., and in all probability will return at 11-30 p.m. on the same day!




One of the main features of Fr. Theophane's life during the fifteen years he spent at St. Anthony's was his activity. He often worked. till late at night, but rose invariably well before the break of dawn. Mass at the Carmelite Convent preceded the work for the day, which never proved a drudgery to him. To Fr. Theophane, the interests of the resident students were closely bound up with those of the institution. One was a necessary corollary of the other. He strove, therefore, to improve the amenities of the boarders. A creative genius, he built and equipped with rare taste the College Infirmary, a model to other schools in the island, the two-storeyed extension to the Villa, the Mansionette, and the stately Refectory for the boarders. With a touch be transformed the shoddy shanties and shacks, relics of military occupation, into habitable dormitories, and a spacious temporary Chapel. An elegant Refectory for the Fathers, one for the resident masters, and a Staff room complete the ensemble of buildings that are monuments to the industry, no less than to the imagination of Fr. Theophane.

Fr. Theophane was the founder of 'The Young Farmers' Club', members of which interested themselves in gardening and animal husbandry. He capitalised the enthusiasm of students, not only to encourage the young to indulge in healthy recreation, but to give them a basic knowledge of the primaeval arts. The vegetable garden, the dairy, the piggery, and the poultry run, have all their votaries. The last mentioned is the most spectacular of Fr. Theophane's ventures. In spacious, modern pens, two hundred and fifty birds of the finest breeds, Austrolorps, Blue and White Leghorns, subsisting on a nutritious diet, reflect in their glossy plumage, their speed and activity, the joys of sane living! The Australorps have shown a lively sense of gratitude for the generous treatment accorded them! In their first year of production, an average of 65 birds laid 12,825 eggs, setting up a record for the island! Some of the young farmers have proprietary interests in the poultry run, owning among themselves a fair number of birds, from which they derive tidy incomes. In this undertaking, Fr. Theophane had the invaluable assistance of an old boy of the College, Mr. Stanley White of the Agricultural Department, to whom a great deal of its success can be attributed, and who continues to take in it the liveliest interest.

It may be said without exaggeration that as Warden, Fr. Theophane exercised an extraordinary influence over those in his charge. He showed understanding of adolescent minds. Tactful, sympathetic, withal stern when the occasion demanded it, he completely captured their imagination. They were certain that they would always receive at his hands justice tempered with mercy. His attitude towards them was paternal, motivated by deep interest in their moral and spiritual welfare. As for them, they regarded him as one of themselves. They bore down on him in his office. They made inroads on his leisure. They invaded the privacy of his room. They hung on him at every turn with constant chatter that




would make ears tingle. However, Fr. Theophane appeared at all times serene and supremely happy in their company! He may have been reduced to utter misery, were he wantonly deprived of it!

Fr. Theophane is of the rare vintage of zealous priests, in whom sound judgement and great discretion are combined with a kind and affectionate nature, a cheerful temperament, and warm humanity. His geniality is never forced and unreal. Never even under the severest strain does his temper break away from its moorings of superhuman patience. Simple, modest, and unassuming, he is all things to all men. It is, therefore, easy to understand the universality of Fr. Theophane, the wide appeal he makes to all as a priest of the Catholic Church, as a man, and as a friend.

Fr. Theophane, newly appointed to the parish of Ampitiya, is one of the busiest priests in the diocese. He manages four schools, and ministers to over 1,500 Catholics in his parish, attends to the spiritual welfare of over 15 Catholic families in Mailapitiya, 12 miles distant, and overlooks a colony of 200 peasants in that village.


Fr. Theophane is ubiquitous, his energy inexhaustible. Widely scattered parishes present no difficulties for him, any more than the heavy burden of his new responsibilities. Miles have shrunk to a span, for he has the virtue of adaptability. Seated astride on a formidable looking Vespa, of which he is today the proud possessor, he laughs derisively at distances!




Siyapatha Finance Supports Road Safety: 'No Parking' Sign Installation at the entrance


Christopher Columbus type DISCOVERY

My grandson is looking at him surprised. He must be wondering how a polar bear has turned to a handsome man and talking nicely.



Motivation and back up support

Thanks Andy, you have continued these wonderful achievements even after leaving college as you have Represented National Basketball team in 1976 and 1977. Represented Sri Lanka police Basketball team from 1976 to 1980. Then Represented the high riding Sri Lanka Police Rugby team from 1976 to 1981. You also Represented SLRFU President's team against a team from Zambia 1973.

Now with all that sports achieves can you please tell us your observations about our college teams during your time at college and present times and what back up support and motivation etc., you got during those days? And were there any role models you admired?

Yes, during my formative years in school, I did not have any particular role model that I tried to emulate. Of course, I did admire some of the senior students for their prowess in various sports, but cannot recall anyone in particular. However, in my late teens I developed an admiration for an ex Peterite, namely the late Royden De Silva, a double international who played rugby for Havelocks and Basketball for Orient sports club. He possessed true grit in both disciplines and was one of the finest gentlemen you could ever meet.

During my sports career in school I had many mentors who prodded me along to achieve the success I achieved. Starting from Mr. George Mackie who used to watch me practise the high jump on his way home from school and lecture me on the finer points of high jumping. But the greatest inspiration, motivation and backing came from our former Principal the late Rev. Fr Aiden De Silva and Fr Aeldred Samarakoon. Without any reservation I can boldly say that I was these two priests who put St Anthony's College back on the map from the nonentities we were, prior to their arrival. Some of the other teachers who backed me during my sports career in school were late Messrs. Angelo Peiris and Willie Fernando.

Well Andy, I remember at school, once you mentioned that your honest intention was to bring honour and glory for the college in whatever sport or any other competitor activity you were engaged, as you associated major part of your early life at the school and being a boarder for almost one and a half decades.

I also remember the Prefects investiture in the early 70s where you were also elected as one of them among 2,500 students. Remember we had only 1 round 20 prefects as the qualifying criteria was very tough then.

Be second to none and believe in your ability to be better than the other after all your opponents are also human. In the school leaving certificate given to me by the then Principal Late Rev. Fr. Aidan De Silva stated the following "Christopher Anderson distinguished himself in whatever he undertook". This should be your goal as well.

Back to senses

Well thank you, I would definitely convey this very important and inspiring message and your story through "Antonian Newsletter" quarterly digital magazine. And I looked to find my grandson Chaarya to go say goodbye with me to this great sportsman and gentleman.

He was not to be seen, but there were little footsteps on snow from the house towards the frozen lake I got damn scared and shouted loud as I could

CHAARYA! CHAARYA! WHERE ARE YOU?

And I felt someone was tapping me on my shoulder. It was my wife trying to wake me up. I asked where is Chaarya? She said Chaarya is sleeping well in the other room. And the time is now 3.15 a.m.


Oh! That's the time many human beings go to deep sleep according to some human scientists.


