In closing, stay safe, and may God's blessings be upon you and your families.




# "ARABIAN NIGHTS" 2024 WHAT A NIGHT IT WAS






# THE RENOVATED COLLEGE HALL IS FORMALLY OPENED



### PROFILING A PETERITE KARATE CHAMPION

Sri Lanka Schools Under-19 Black Belt Karate Champion and twice a South Asian medallion ranked 11th by World Karate Federation Randev Athukorala was awarded Sri Lanka Schools Colours by the Ministry of Education and Sri Lanka University Colours for the year 2023.A 5th year Coloursman in Karate at St. Peter's College and 'Most Outstanding Sportsman', he went on to win the 'Best All-round Student' in his final year at college.



Young Athukorala went on to earn 4 A's at the Advanced Level Examination of the Ministry of Education and secured entrance to the University of Sri Jayewardene. His passion for Karate began at the tender age of five years under Coach Sensei D.M.D. Nimal said, "Randev has been living the values of karate since his small age. He had his fair share of failures which has made him a competitive sportsman assisted by Coach Safraz.

Having captained the Sri Lanka Schools Karate Team, Randev went under the wing of the Sri Lanka National Coach Sensei Kalyana who brought out the best of him, said the St. Peter's Head Master Noel Cooray. Randev went on to win the Gold Medal at the South Asian Karate Championships in New Delhi, India, and also the World Championships in Teheran, Iran. "The lesson other sportsmen must emulate from Randev is how he balanced sports, studies, extracurricular activities, and being a Senior Prefect," said the St. Peters College Rector Rev. Fr. Rohitha Rodrigo.


The World Karate Association Rankings listed him at number 17 in the world in the Cadet 70 kg+ weight class in 2017, and he went on to achieve a personal best of 11th in the global ranking. In the Asian region, young Athukorala was ranked second behind Indonesian athlete Billy Bilmona Mohammad Besnuh, while Chinese Karateka Yunlong Hu finished third behind the Sri Lankan that year. There are only three athletes from Asia who have broken into the world's top 30 rankings, said Coach Kalyana.

"I was diagnosed with dengue just 41 days before the South Asian Karate Championships in New Delhi, India but I wanted to fight for Sri Lanka and was happy to win the Gold," said Randev. When the pandemic hit Sri Lanka we lost the best years of my life in the world of sports but I focused strongly on studies. It was very motivating when I received 4 A's and qualified to enter university.

My next challenge is to win a medal at the World Inter University Games. But first, the world must see Sri Lanka out of the current economic challenge," added Randev.



# RUGBY CHARACTERS I HAVE KNOWN (BY MICHAEL DE NIESE)



As a rugby player during the 60's era my College playing career spanned 3 years. Without any doubt those were the best 3 years of my time at St Peters College.

Every school day started (and ended) with an almost ritualistic cup of tea and a "Bristol" at the infamous 'Canal View' Hotel. Friendly waiters kept a sharp eye out for any unheralded visits by 'masters' who did not seem to approve of this practice. It was here that I met up with some of the most unforgettable characters of my school career.

The ones that stick most closely in my mind were some of the ruggerites of that era and I shall endeavour to tell you about them.

My first captain and one of the largest who springs to mind was Rohan Abeysundera - or 'Vul Abe' as he was affectionately known. For some unknown reason Rohan did not particularly like this nickname and threatened all who used it with dire consequences.

He was not particularly fond of me, because in my efforts to make the first fifteen I use to 'undercut' him quite often in the line outs. A giant of a man, his landing chest first made the ground shake. I used to quickly make tracks for home after practice for fear of awful retribution but in reality Rohan was a good tempered guy and I'm sure he has forgiven me.

There was our hooker - Selvan Mather. Small of stature but lightening fast with his strike. Mistakenly called 'young Mather' by a journalist (he was one of the oldest team members at that time), the nickname stuck. My least favourite memory of him was running to collect a high ball during the Zahira match and colliding head first with 'young Mather'. We each lost a tooth or two and a bit of blood and the game went on.

Another unique personality was Franklin Bowen - almost European in appearance, bow-legged and quite fast. Frank was a good centre but he had a particular aversion to tackling. His favourite method and one least appreciated by opposing centres (and referees) was to run towards an opponent at full speed and stick out an arm at right angles to his body, which made contact with an opponents throat. Needless to say - this was not copy book rugby.

And who will forget that unholy Trinity of Brian 'Ali Kan' Pieris, Tony Joseph and Gary Pompeus. They were legends! Brian will always be remembered for his murderous tackle of our beloved coach Archibald Perera during a practice session which almost put him in hospital.

Tony Joseph will be remembered for his reckless play in 'the loose' both on and off the rugby field and Gary Pompeus's for his line out jumping as well as his rugby gear which always looked like he had retrieved it from the dirty clothes bin.

Once he arrived for practice with his boots tied with 'kohu land'. I cannot repeat 'Archies' comment about Gary's appearance.

Then there was Durand Beckmeyer. Short of stature but loud of voice. Those who know him will never forget that hysterical laugh and his boastful predictions of the number of tries he would score during any particular game. (Which he almost

always fulfilled). His low slung swerving run demolished many a school side, and not known for his shyness Durand would relive every moment after the game.

During this era, St Peters College had many great tacklers. Ranjan Rajendran, Aubrey Paternott, Kitsiri Cooray, Everard Hoffman, Paramasoothy to name a few. But none struck more terror into the hearts of opposing backline players than Dennis Killalea. Better known as 'Butto' (the origin of the nickname is not known). Dennis was one of the most devastating tacklers on the rugger field. His method was simple - he would launch himself at you like a human projectile - often head on. There were no prizes for guessing who came off worst.

Then there was Junaideen and Vashista. Two players of great skill and courage but we were always unsure whether they were actually attending college while sporting the Peterite Jersey. There were even whispers that they both attended Nawala Hall and had actually left school, but I'm sure those were just rumours. I will never forget half back Junaideen's snake-like runs through the blind side, head always pointing to the sky but his passes always found the sure hands of Darrel Wimalaratne. Unfortunately "Vashi" is no longer with us but I will always remember him for his tireless work in the third row and his great sense of humour.

Before I close I have to mention Sathiavadivel. 'Sathi' was unique among schoolboy fullbacks. Short and powerfully built with muscles chiselled on the parallel bars of 'Rudra Park', Sathi was an impressive figure. Even more impressive than his appearance were his kicking skills honed in the unforgiving soccer fields of his youth. The drop-kick was his forte which he seemed to utilise in impossible situations. Not for Sathi was the standard drop-goal 25 metres under the posts - he would let them go from anywhere. I will never forget the roar that used to go up when Sathi joined the line. 'Sathi-drop' was the chant and he always obliged - occasionally by dropping the ball but mostly with a devastating drop kick for 3 points.

These were some of the names of players who would no doubt bring a wry smile to the faces of team mates and opponents. I must not forget to add that these players besides being unique characters, were also proud Peterites whose performances on the field brought much credit to the *Alma Mater*. There were other great schoolboy players at this time, but this is a story about characters who happened to be great players also. I will remember all of them with much fondness.

It was the second reunion in three years and the Peterite spirit and enthusiasm shone through as strongly as ever. In addition to the good time, the night served as a fundraiser to benefit students at St. Peter's College, Bambalapitiya.

Reunion organising committee spokesman Rienzie Machado said funds raised would pay for 3–5 scholarships over the next three years. A Grade 11 and 12 scholarship is about \$200. I am sure we can fund a few, Machado said.

The Blue that Crowns the World reunion truly lived up to its billing, with the highlight being the presence of old boys from overseas. Notable among them were former Peterite captains Travice Fernando and Michael Elias who travelled from Colombo. Machado said: It was amazing to see the Peterites reconnect, it was as if we had just left the gates of our school. As organisers, we aimed to lift the bar on the 2008 reunion and make it a night to remember. What a terrific response we had from the committee and Peterites of all vintages."

Music was provided by many past students including well-known entertainers Darrell de Silva, Randy Pieris (from Sydney), and Dwight Vangramberg (Perth). The brilliant choral group of young Peterites, based in Sydney, provided the audience with something special as they harmonised in true barbershop fashion. Other highlights of the night were specially brewed Peterite beers, a canteen reenactment, fully catered buffet dinner, laughter-inducing skits and the appearance of Fr. Rector aka Rienzie Machado.

However, the piece de resistance of the night was when Peterite voices were raised in a stirring rendition of the college anthem – Lend a Heart and Lend a Hand, with not a song sheet in sight.

Plans are now underway for the Peterites to reconnect again in 2014, with moves for the next venue to be Brisbane.
