#### **EDITORIAL**

## The Impact of Illegal drugs on Sri Lanka.

Illegal drug use does not just affect the life of the person using these drugs, the local community is also affected and there are wider reaching bad effects on society on the whole. Many thefts and violent attacks are by illegal drug users, illegal drug peddlers and illegal drug sellers, these persons are desperate to become billionaires knowing very well what a crime they do to the people and society and families suffer most often because of drug addicts within their families. The government or NGOs are compelled to spend money to rehabilitate addicts, which money could have been used towards development projects of the town or country. Buying illegal drugs in the street helps the big international traffickers to stay in business making sure that drug related crimes and suffering continue in the country and round the world. Drug related problems increases the risk of HIV AIDS in society and Hepatitis the dreaded liver disease, as knowingly these foolish people share syringes needles which contain illegal drugs. The College and parental Authorities must be aware from now on in particular and focus seriously on this mission in order to eradicate illegal drug use, as such Distribution is done by Cartel traffickers, by carriers, by transportation in cars in school buses and

vans, by boats, by ships, by people concealing illicit drugs inside their inner under garments most of the time. AND By friend's and relations under our very noses. In conclusion, Drug awareness needs open dialogue which is a pre requisite, to facilitate anti-drugs campaign. This is recommended between parents and children and between teachers and pupils. Say no to drugs.





## Traditional Annual Saints Old Boys Quadrangular Worked Out on 8th and 9th November 2025 (St. Anthony's, St. Benedict's, St. Joseph's and St. Peter's)

The 56th Saints Quadrangular Tournament Opening Ceremony was held at St. Joseph's. Appreciation is extended to Shabith Muthalif (Exco) and his colleague Chinthaka Wickramaarachchi for coordinating the rugby players. A special thank you is also due to Kushana Michael, who assisted in finding four replacement players at the last moment when four players dropped out. Kushana, together with Shehan, continued contacting players until 9.00 pm on Saturday. Kushana also stayed back in Colombo and played in the Rugby 7s matches on Sunday. In addition, he coordinated the Over-40 cricket team at short notice and represented the team on Saturday.

SACKOBA Colombo Branch has represented the College at the Saints Quadrangular Organizing Committee since the inaugural tournament in 1963. The Quadrangular originated when the Old Boys of St. Benedict's College organized a cricket tournament to celebrate the 60th anniversary of their alma mater and invited Old Boys teams from several schools. Only the Old Boys of St. Anthony's (SACKOBA Colombo), St. Joseph's (Old Josephians Sports Club) and St. Peter's (Old Peterites Sports Club) responded, and the tournament was played. Antonian late Ranjith Samarasekera encouraged the Old Boys of the three schools to make it an annual event, with the aim of fostering camaraderie among the four schools. Since then, the tournament has continued for 62 consecutive years, with the Colombo OBA ensuring consistent participation and financial support.

Antonian late Harry Jayasundara was the first Captain in 1963, and his son Hiran Jayasundara, the 1975 College Captain, also represented the Old Antonians years later. Members of the Executive Committee representing the Colombo OBA at the Saints Quadrangular Association (SQA) Organizing Committee for the 2025 Saints Quadrangular are: President of Colombo OBA Mr. Jude Pillai (Immediate Past President of SQA 2024), Samantha de Silva, Chandika Jayawardene, Kushana Michael, Ladislaus Gnanapragasam, Asela Herath, and Asanka Rajasinghe. Former Colombo OBA Exco member Mr. Ranjith Peiris, a senior active member of the SQA, has been recognized and appointed as Vice Patron of the Saints Quadrangular Association.

Team coordinators nominated by the Colombo OBA to the SQA are: Alex Anthony for Basketball, Chinthaka Wickramaarachchi for Rugby, and Selwyn Jamion for Under-40 Cricket. Appreciation is also extended to Shehan Fernando for stepping in as the 11th player for the Over-40 cricket team, despite having no prior experience in hard-ball cricket; fortunately, he completed the match without injury. Thanks are also due to Pramodth for participating in the Under-40 team and to Chandika Jayawardana for coordinating the Under-40 cricket team.

Although this is a Colombo OBA event, it was disappointing to note that none of the other Exco members were present at the grounds except for the members who took part in the teams and President Jude Pillai, who attended both the Opening and Closing Ceremonies. Rev. Fr. Henry Wijeratne OSB travelled from Kandy to be present at the Closing Ceremony. Only three Antonians were seen at the grounds: Mr. Ramanathan from the 1972 batch, Vimalakanthan from the 1996 batch, and Zaharan Liyabdeen from the 2003 batch. Zaharan's wife represented the Kandy Convent PPA team on Sunday.

The SACK Over-40 Basketball team emerged Runners-Up at the 56th Tournament. St. Peter's were the Overall Champions, and SACK finished in 4th place among the four Catholic colleges in this traditional annual Quadrangular.



This is a true story of a group of young Antonians looking for something to do during the April/May holidays in 1962.

The Duff-Tytlers and Mackys were neighbours at the time, down Cemetery Road Kandy, Ceylon. There happened to be a gathering of friends including Robin, Tony and Chris Duff-Tytler, myself, Walter Lodewyke and Chris Wanigaserkera. We were sitting around chatting, at the Duff-Tytler residence wondering what to make of ourselves during the holidays. All sorts of suggestions were made and the best one came from Robin. His brilliant idea was a cycling trip to Colombo. This sounded a good idea to me and the other Duff-Tytler brothers, Tony & Chris. Walter & Chris Wanigasekera laughed at us and suggested that we were crazy to think of such a ridiculous escapade. The two of them were not agreeable to this idea of Robin's and said that they were not interested in joining us. However Walter very kindly offered his Leica Camera to us, to record our trip and prove that we actually travelled by bike and did not cheat by taking the train!!! They made jokes about reading the obituary notices to see if any of us had died in attempting this trip! We were settled on this idea of Robin's and set about planning our trip. We had to borrow two bikes for Tony and Chris as I had a BSA racing bike and Robin had an old "standard bike. We borrowed Nihal Abeyaratne's Raleigh Sports for Tony. Nihal was my team mate and was responsible for spinning Trinity out in the 1962 "Big Match". He lived close to us at Asgiriya, near the Trinity grounds. I cannot recall where we got a bike for Chris. Not one of us can remember. May be alzheimers is sitting in!!! Once we got the bikes, we bought vulcanizing kits for repairing tyre punctures and set about making sure all the bikes were in good order.

We got a map and now decided that we could make this a memorable trip by settling on this route. We planned that we would travel to Colombo, Galle, Hambantota, up to Wellawaya then to Passara and back through Nuwara Eliya to Kandy. We all agreed that we could make it okay. We went to Fr Bede Amerasinghe, who was our parish priest at St Anthony's Cathedral, Kandy and asked him to please give us a letter of introduction, which would come in very handy indeed. Once we had all this in place we went to our respective fathers and asked for permission to make this trip.

Permission was granted on the proviso that we buy post cards and pre-address them, and we post them at respective destinations, so that they new we were okay. We were given a little money by our dads, George Macky and Stephen Duff-Tytler.

At this moment I must say that we did not have mothers (both had passed away) and maybe our fathers thought that we young and responsible boys and needed to do something like this to make men of us! Once permission was granted we checked out the bikes to make sure they were in working order. We packed our knapsacks with very little clothes as we wanted to travel as light as possible. We had to have room for vulcanizing kits and other little items. We commenced our trip on a Monday morning as I recall and we estimated travel time to Colombo to be around 6-8 hours. He finally came good and we got to Colombo around 8.00 PM. This was nearly 12 hours since we left Kandy!!!

Now, we did not have much money and so went to the "Gallery" which is at front of the cinema. I recall the cost of a ticket to be 50 cents. By the way this was the first time I had been to the gallery. After the movie we had something to eat and had to look for a place to bed down for the night. We went to the Colombo Municipal Council garage and asked the caretaker whether we could sleep somewhere. He was very obliging and asked to sleep in the council garage! The next day we set off for Galle.

The weather was hot and dry and it was hard work cycling after the gruelling previous days effort. We took our time, admiring the scenery, especially along the coast. We had as much refreshments as possible. Thambili" (young coconut water) was the best thing for us. Along the way we stopped at a small coconut property and asked whether we could buy some "Thambili". When the poor people learned that we were from Kandy, they offered to share their lunch with us. "Pol sambol" and rice.

We gladly took up the offer, as we were hungry and thirsty. They gave us "Thambili" to drink as well as rice and pol sambol for lunch. We were pretty grateful to these poor people who were willing to share their simple meal with us. God bless them. This was the second time that we experienced such decency and friendliness. We continued on the way to Galle, stopping to cool off in the sea, and wash some of our clothes!!We hung the clothes on our bikes for quick drying! We arrived in Galle earlier than expected and made a tour of the harbour and some of the sights, before looking for somewhere to camp for the night. Fr Bede's letter came in handy when we went to the parish church and asked the priest there if we could find somewhere to sleep. Having read Fr Bede's letter, he gladly gave us a place to sleep and fed us as well!! We slept on beds for a change! After the experience of the Colombo Municipal council garage floor, this was heaven!

We decided that we had to travel quicker, and to this end, made a challenge to get to Hambantota by the next night. We got moving from Galle fairly early in the morning after a nice meal that the parish priest organised for us.

The sergeant in charge said that there was nothing he could offer, except a crashed CTB bus that was in the compound and if we were happy to sleep in the bus, we had no problem with that. We gladly accepted his offer and slept on the hard seats. We were so tired that sleep came easily, even though the seats we uncomfortable.

WE got to Wellawaya pretty quickly and after a few stops for tyre punctures and lunch, we continued on and arrived at Ury Group just on dusk. We were welcomed with open arms by the Wickremasinghes and given right royal treatment! We were able to have showers and sat down to a wonderful meal. We actually were ashamed at the amounts we devoured. We had seconds as well. I suppose this was because we had not had a proper meal since we left home. The Wickremasinghes suggested that we stay another night and rest, before we left for Nuwara Eliya.

We were well fed and had showers for a second time and felt fresh when we let the next day for Nuwara Eliya.

I must add that this was happening in the night. We had no lights and were lucky not to get hit by passing traffic.


We were so tired that we parted to go to our respective homes for a well earned rest.
